- Determine lead/trail directions (left or rt.)
- Decide touchline/goal line responsibilities
- Review proper mechanics/techniques
- Emphasize eye contact; consult if needed
- Simultaneous whistle defer to head ref
- Coordination Issues
 - Substitutions
 - Injuries
 - Restarts




Kickoffs – Lead Referee has the clock and the Trail Referee has the whistle.

Positioning No Touchline Hugging




Flexible Pattern – requires high work rate to stay close enough to play and still be able to cover the offside decision


The Trail Referee become the "CR" as play moves toward the goal, but must be ready to get back to the other end to call offside when play turns around.




Lead referee across the goal may be necessary, but may also compromise the offside decision.





